FROM THE PUBLISHER'S DESK

Ted Adams here. I'm going to be your monthly guide through the IDW/Top Shelf checklist, pointing out our big hits and bringing your attention to some gems that you might otherwise miss.

IDW's roots are deeply grounded in creator-owned comics. The first comic we published was **30 Days** of **Night** by **Steve Niles** and **Ben Templesmith**, and we've published hundreds of creator-owned titles over the last decade and a half. This month we've got four new ones that I'm proud to be bringing into the world.

Archangel is by legendary author William Gibson



and artist **Butch Guice**. One of the most influential authors of the last twenty years, Gibson is making his comic book debut. We've paired him with one of my favorite artists—Butch's work on *X-Men/Micronauts* back in 1984 was one of the series that kept me reading comics—and the combination is turning out to be something special.

The Biggest Bang comes to us from D.J. Kirkbride and Vassilis Gogtzilas and is a sequel to last year's The Bigger Bang by the same creative team. They explore what happens when their hero, Cosmos, finds himself being worshiped as a god.

Steve Horton and **Stephen Thompson**'s **Satellite Falling** tells the tale of a bounty hunter on a satellite full of aliens. This is first-class world-building that combines the best elements of space opera with a first-person narrative straight out of a Raymond Chandler Philip Marlowe story.

Last but not least is *Brutal Nature* by Luciano
Saracino and Ariel Olivetti, a fully painted story of a man who uses a collection of masks to transform himself into different beasts and monsters. Every page is a work of art, and Ariel's character design is some of the best I've ever seen.

Top Shelf also has two great creator-owned books in May. *Cigarette Girl* is a Japanese urban drama by one of Japan's top alternative-comics artists,


Masahiko Matsumoto, and The Jekyll Island Chronicles is an alternate history that takes place between the World Wars and combines historical fact with steampunk technology.

Eurocomics brings us *The Adventures of Dieter Lumpen* by Jorge Zentner and Rubén Pellejero. Dieter is a man of the world, an adventurer who wants no part of adventure but is, nonetheless, swept along to exotic locations from Turkey to the Caribbean and everywhere in between. Pellejero is one of Europe's premiere comics artists and was selected to follow in the footsteps of comics master Hugo Pratt on new *Corto Maltese* stories.

We've got a couple of fun kids comics launching this month—*Disney Magic Kingdom Comics* #1—an anthology of stories that take place at

Disneyland—and Teenage
Mutant Ninja Turtles: Carmelo
Anthony Special. That's right—
the NBA superstar teams up
with everyone's favorite
mutated turtles to help in the
fight against the Foot Clan.

At the other end of the spectrum, we have two releases that are for adults only—the biggest art book we've ever done with Ashley Wood, simply titled Ashley Wood, and Fear & Loathing in



Las Vegas #1—a comic book version of Troy Little's graphic novel adaptation, presented in black-and-white and at a larger size. Both of these books are important to me—Ash is one of my closest friends, and the very first book we published at IDW was his first art book, Uno Fanta, and I helped edit the Fear & Loathing adaptation.

May will also see the release of *Jack Kirby's The Mighty Thor Artist's Edition*. Every time we talk about this one, I have to pinch myself to make sure I'm not dreaming. Printed at a huge 15" x 22", this 160 page volume includes complete stories from *Journey into Mystery #'s* 111, 117, 118, and more, plus a beautiful gallery section.

Wynonna Earp continues to air every Friday night at 10 p.m. on Syfy. The action heats up as Wynonna and her allies—Agent Dolls, Doc Holliday, and her sister, Waverly—track down Wyatt Earp's resurrected kills.
